Narrative

Program Rationale

The program was developed through WIT's involvement with the local advisory board including members from Topeka area childcare facilities, USD 501 Head Start, Childcare Aware of Kansas, and Washburn University Bachelors of Elementary Education faculty. The changes and expansion came about as the group was made aware of childcare and early childhood education being a critical need for the area and a shortage of trained workers.

Program Description

Program Outcomes

Students should know or be able to do at the completion of the program:

- Develop an understanding of the childcare profession through its history, types of programs, and teaching practices.
- Use appropriate strategies for observation to assess for planning and implementing instruction.
- Demonstrate the ability to perform engaging developmentally appropriate practices for young children.
- Develop knowledge of young children's development, health, language, and cognitive skills.
- Develop human relation skills with children, families, communities, and colleagues.
- Develop knowledge of young children with special needs and managing inclusive early childhood education settings.

Admission Requirements

Applicants who wish to apply for admission to Washburn Institute of Technology need to have the abilities necessary to benefit from instruction in an occupational field. Prospective students are required to take an Accuplacer Placement Test and pass with the necessary scores for their desired technical program before they are eligible to enroll. Applicants may only enroll in one technical program at a time. Accuplacer Scores for Early Childhood Education program: Math - Level 4; Reading - Level 4.

Secondary Enrollment Procedure

Enrollment is open to qualified students who are currently enrolled in high school. High school students who wish to enroll in a technical program at Washburn Institute of Technology must follow the procedures listed below:

1. Take the Admissions Test (free while in high school) either at Washburn Institute of Technology or their home high school (when available).
2. Complete an online application at <http://www.washburntech.edu/admissions/apply.html>
3. Discuss scores and program of interest with an Admissions Counselor.
4. Submit an in-progress official high school transcript.
5. Enroll during designated enrollment periods. Program registration is done on a first come, first serve basis. Many programs have limited enrollment capacity and/or are competitive programs. Admissions Counselors can provide program specific information.

Post-Secondary Enrollment Procedures

Post-secondary students who wish to enroll in a technical program must follow the procedures listed below:

1. Take the Admissions Test at Washburn Institute of Technology

3. Discuss scores and program of interest with an Admissions Counselor.
4. Submit official high school transcripts.
5. Enroll during designated enrollment periods. Program registration is done on a first come, first serve basis. Many programs have limited enrollment capacity and/or are competitive programs. Admissions Counselors can provide program specific information.

Graduation Requirements

Washburn University Board of Regents with the recommendation of the faculty of Washburn University Institute of Technology confers degrees at the end of the fall and spring semesters and summer session to students who have met all requirements as of the last day of final examinations for that session. All work not completed by the last day of finals will result in a graduation date of the following semester or later if a previous “incomplete” has not been finalized. If a student is concurrently enrolled at another institution and intends to use the work to complete graduation requirements at WIT, an official transcript from the institution must be received within two weeks of WIT’s last final examination date of the graduating semester to have the degree conferred in the same semester. WIT holds a commencement ceremony at the end of the fall and spring semesters. Students who complete requirements for a certificate or degree during fall semester will be invited to participate in the fall commencement ceremony. Students who complete requirements for a certificate or degree during the spring semester will be invited to participate in the spring commencement ceremony. Students completing required coursework in summer session will be invited to participate in fall commencement. All such candidates must have the Application for Graduation form on file.

Demand for the Program

The Kansas Department of Labor Long-term Occupation Projections 2020-2030 indicate a statewide change of employment for Childcare Workers under SOC 39-9011 of -.7% annually, with an annual median wage of \$22,460. A high school diploma or equivalent is the typical education needed for entry. Annual openings equate to 1,022 jobs per year.

There are many business and industry supporters of this program in the Topeka regional area. Letters of support are included in this packet.

This program is not targeted at high school students, therefore there is no letter of support provided. High school students are welcome to enroll if they meet the admissions requirements.

The Perkins Regional Needs Assessment for the Topeka Region indicate that for 19.0709 Early Childhood Professional (Post-Secondary) there are 22 Concentrators and 294 Annual Openings. The annual Wage is \$22,229. The corresponding SOC Code is 39-9011 Childcare Workers/Nannies with 294 Openings and annual salary of \$22,229.

Duplication of Existing Programs

Information from several peer institutions was used to benchmark program expansion. Specially, contact was made with Butler, Cowley, and Johnson Community College. The program instructor also worked with Pittsburg State University and Washburn University education faculty to look at how students could transition to a four-year institution if they chose that option.

There are nine institutions in the state offering programs under the CIP code 19.0708 or 19.0709. That information is listed below.

Course Descriptions

ECE 100 Introduction to Early Childhood Education (3 credits)

This course will enable the student to recognize and create a developmentally appropriate curriculum and environment, to connect Developmentally Appropriate Practice (DAP) to early learning standards, and to comply with state licensing regulations. The student will be able to discuss and explain the history, principles, philosophy, teaching practices, approaches, professional ethical standards, and career trends in the field of early childhood education. The student will be able to identify the types and role of observation, documentation, and assessment in the early childhood field. Will include CPR/First Aid training for students without current certification.

ECE 127 Child Health, Safety, and Nutrition (3 credits)

This course will enable the student to demonstrate an understanding of the basic factors that affect child health, safety, and nutrition. The student will design appropriate educational experiences and family newsletters that focus on health, safety, and nutrition for the young child. The student will identify and apply the nutritional guidelines appropriate for young children while menu planning. Additionally, this course will provide instruction on the subject of abuse and neglect of children. The course will discuss the various types and indicators of abuse and neglect as well as prevention issues. Kansas laws will be discussed as will current community, state, and federal efforts to deal with this problem.

ECE 112 Preschool Development (3 credits)

This course focuses on the development, implementation, and assessment of appropriate environments and curricula for young children ages three through five. Emphasis is on understanding children's developmental stages and developing appropriate learning opportunities, interactions, and environments in the following areas: emergent literacy, math, science, technology, and social studies.

ECE 135 Infant and Toddler Development & Care (3 credits)

This course will enable the student to understand the physical, mental, emotional, and social growth of the child from conception through the second year. The student will apply the knowledge gained to discuss contemporary issues in group care, critique the quality of center care, assess the developmental level of infants and toddlers, identify guidance techniques, and develop safe and appropriate toys and creative activities.

ECE 151 Early Childhood Curriculum Development (3 credits)

This course introduces techniques for guiding the following types of experiences: art, storytelling, puppetry, writing, math, science, social studies, music, and field trips. Assessment of the course includes written and assigned activities.

HCT 134 Human Growth and Development (3 credits)

This course provides an introduction to physical, cognitive, emotional, and social aspects of human development throughout the life span. It emphasizes developmental processes beginning with conception and continuing throughout childhood, adolescence, adulthood, later life and death. The course focuses on developmental processes, cultural influences, and other factors that make each individual unique. This course takes an interdisciplinary approach toward human development that is based on science and applied toward the goal of solving important human problems.

ECE 131 Children with Special Needs (3 credits)

This course will enable the student to develop skills associated with providing quality care and education to young children with disabilities and chronic conditions. The student will explore issues of positioning, feeding, adaptive equipment, family dynamics, inclusion, and invasive procedures.

ECE 148 Early Childhood Education Lab I (3 credits)

This course involves participation in the licensed child care center under supervision of the unit leader. Students use knowledge and skills expected of professionals new to the early care and education field. Assessment of the course includes preparing lesson plans and implementing activities in the center with evaluation completed by the unit leader.

ECE 119 Creative Experiences for Young Children (3 credits)

This course will enable the student to demonstrate effective and creative guidance techniques while creating a positive early childhood learning environment. The student will understand the role of observation in early childhood programs and will be able to determine the appropriate techniques to assess and monitor the development of various ages. The student will be able to establish positive social expectations for a group of children and effectively evaluate and manage difficult behaviors based on children's individual needs and developmental abilities in cooperation with the children's families and relevant professionals.

ECE 212 Children's Play and Games (3 credits)

This course is designed to stress the importance of play learning attitudes and environments. Students learn the importance of movement in relation to what children learn, and that play environments should encourage children to explore, imagine, invent, and express feelings.

ECE 141 Early Language & Literacy Development (3 credits)

This course is designed to teach students how to recognize and implement appropriate environmental strategies that support early literacy development and appropriate early experiences with books and writing. Emphasis is placed on speaking and listening, as well as reading and writing readiness. Upon completion of the course, students will be able to select, plan, implement, and evaluate appropriate early literacy experiences.

ECE 155 Early Childhood Education Lab II (3 credits)

This course involves participation in the licensed child care center under the supervision of the unit leader. Students should demonstrate increased knowledge and skills by assuming a teacher's role. Assessment of the course includes planning, developing, and implementing lesson plans with evaluation done by the unit leader.

ECE 202 Administration in Early Childhood (3 credits)

This course will enable the student to describe key functions and strategies used by motivational leaders in Early Childhood Education. The student will develop reflective teaching skills and demonstrate strong commitment and knowledge of early childhood development by creating a professional portfolio based on the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Professional Standards and Competencies for Early Childhood Educators.

ECE 205 Foundation of Education (3 credits)

Teaching concepts and practices as they apply to today's elementary and secondary schools will be introduced. Topics will include the roles and responsibilities of the teacher, various modes of instruction, specialized areas in teaching, and professional requirements and concerns. Twenty hours of observation in a school setting is required.

ECE 200 Developing Family Relationships (3 credits)

This course will enable the student to establish respectful and reciprocal relationships that support, value, and empower all families to be involved in their children's development and learning. The student will utilize communication methods and engagement strategies to involve and support family systems and create partnerships between home and school.

ECE 227 Early Childhood Education Internship (3 credits)

The Early Childhood Internship course provides students the opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge of teaching young children. The student teaching experience will occur with children of age groups between birth to five in an inclusive setting.

Accreditation

The program will not be pursuing accreditation at this time. Students will earn their First Aid & CPR certifications.

Faculty

Faculty teaching in the Early Childhood Education program must have a Bachelor's degree in Early Childhood, Child Development, or Education with an Early Childhood emphasis (master's preferred); OR Master's degree in any discipline with a minimum of 18 graduate credit hours in Early Childhood or a combination of education, professional tested and equivalent experience that provide a foundation in the specific subject matter being taught.

Cost and Funding for Proposed Program

There are no additional program costs for AY23, though there will be a need for additional faculty in AY24. As other programs are retired, this frees up funds for the opportunity for an additional instructor, which is the biggest cost associated with the expansion of the current Cert A to the revised Cert A and the addition of a Cert C. The program includes additional tiered courses; therefore, we are requesting additional Excel in CTE funds (CA-1b is attached). There are currently no grants being used for the Early Childhood program.

Program Review and Assessment

As one of the colleges/schools at Washburn University, Washburn University Institute of Technology offers non-degree certificate programs in Career and Technical Education (CTE), ranging from Advanced Systems Technology to Surgical Technology. These post-secondary, college-level programs lead to certificates of completion (Stand-Alone Parent Programs; up to 16 credit hours) or the technical certificates (Cert A; Cert B; Cert C).

The purpose of a Program Review is to ensure a quality learning experience for our students by undergoing a systematic, periodic comprehensive review of all aspects of the technical program.

As a member of the Association for Career and Technical Education (ACTE), Washburn Tech has voluntarily chosen to follow the *Quality CTE Program of Study Framework (Quality Framework)*. This framework (checklist) consists of 12 elements and 92 criteria that lead to a quality technical education program. As part of the Program Review process at Washburn Tech, instructors will complete this checklist to determine goals and priorities for improving the program. In addition to completing the checklist, instructors will attach relevant documentation that further demonstrates evidence that each criterion is being addressed. The results of the Quality Framework will be the basis for the program review report to be submitted to Washburn University, which has specific guidelines for the program review process as follows:

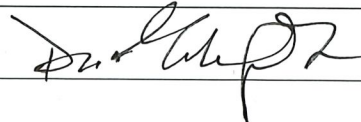
